## BOOK PROJECT

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*Modernist Farming: Writing the Rural Cosmopolitan in the Long Twentieth Century*

Emerging from my dissertation, this project examines representations of farming produced at the historical moment when farming became a minoritarian way of life due to urbanization and industrialization. Far from depicting the farm as a quaint vestige of an outdated values system, the fiction writers under study, including Thomas Hardy, Willa Cather, Leslie Marmon Silko, and Mahasweta Devi represent the farm as grounds for modern experimentation in gender play, indigenous and immigrant creativity, and ecological thought. In these texts, losing the farm to industrialization and commercialization does not signify the loss of “the simple life,” but rather the loss of the chance for modern society to benefit from distinctly rural innovation.
